Cut to the Budget


An Inside Look at HS MSE's Money

HS MSE has an annual school budget of roughly \$5 million. This wealth is visible in the small class size, the abundant supply of computers and software, and the newly renovated Baskerville building. But why is the school so wealthy? Where does the money come from? Is it well spent?

The school's budget is broken down into three major sources. The most substantial of which is tax levied money. When spending this money, a school's first priority and greatest expense is the teachers' salaries. The salaries are based on the teachers' levels of education and the length of time that they have been teaching. Once the salaries are met, the school is free to spend the remainder on other necessities like desks, stationary, and appli-

Another source of school income is the New York State Textbook Law [NYSTL.] This money comes from New York State, and is allocated per each student in a school (e.g. \$20 per student.) The school has almost no flexibility on how this money is used. Every dollar must be spent on state approved textbooks and software (a stamp



covers of such materials.) The rest of the school income comes from

grants. Grants are written by the A.P. (Assistant Principal) of Operations of a school (in our case, Mr. Roseman) and most are paid out by New York State, although some are paid by private donors. Grant money is similar to NYSTL money in that there is no flexibility in its spending. If a grant is written to buy computers, every dollar of that grant must be spent on computers. This explains why a school can have excess in one resource and a need for another.

Interestingly enough, Mr. Roseman and Mr. Dugan have saved up roughly \$750,000 for the school over the past several years. The plan was to spend this money renovating and furnishing the second floor of Baskerville, allowing the high school to move out of the NAC. Another good reason to save this money is so that the school can withstand budget cuts and not have to excess teachers. With the country on the verge of a recession, these budget cuts are coming. the N.Y.C. office of management and budget, Bloomberg will cut \$185.4 million from the education budget this year, and that figure will be closer to \$330 million next year. With hard times coming, saving \$750,000 may turn out to have been a very good idea.

With the departure of Mr. Carey, Ms. Dipaolo, Ms. Doucette and Mr. Wang, rumor had it that they were laid off due to the 2007 budget cuts. This is impossible for two reasons. For one, teachers cannot be laid off. Teachers' contracts prevent that. If the school cannot afford to pay them, they can only be sent, or "excessed" to another school that can. More important-

ly, the budget cut in 2007 decreased the school's funding by only \$70,000, and HS MSE had a surplus of \$750,000 by that same year. Clearly money was not the issue. The teachers left for personal reasons.

While our \$5 million budget seems like a lot, it's important to keep in mind that we have several teachers for each subject, and relatively few students (on average, fewer than 25) per class. This could be one of the reasons for HS MSE's success as a school. It received an "A" in the New York City progress report of 2007 and was ranked the #2 high school in the city by the Department of Education (Townsend High School was ranked #1.) Whether or not this success is completely due to the size of our faculty is debatable.

Studies like the "Tennessee STAR" (Student Teacher Achievement Ratio,) Wisconsin's "SAGE" program (Student Achievement Guarantee in Education,) and Indiana's "Project Prime Time" relate small class size to better academic performance in elementary school students. However data about high school class size is inconclusive. This may suggest that at some point small class size becomes less of a requirement and more of a personal preference. HS MSE is known for its small classes, so it is likely many of the school's applicants simply prefer that. Either way, if small classes aren't the best option, they are at least the most expensive. Small classes mean more

teachers; more teachers mean more salaries to pay.

Mr. Dugan doesn't know what the full effect of the coming budget cuts will be, but he said that he would try to preserve the teacher student ratio and instead cut back on supplies like Smartboards. The Baskerville renovation may also be put on hold. Hopefully these sacrifices will be enough, but it is still too early to tell what the full impact of the budget cuts will be.

This could be the last of the 3D printers in our school if budget cuts continue.


In economics, Obama plans a grand sweep of reforms ranging from universal health care and tax cuts for 95% of Americans. As a distinction, 40% of Americans don't pay taxes and you can't make cuts on nothing so the figure is closer to 55%. However, he states, "fact that we're spending \$12 billion every month in Iraq means that we can't engage in the kind of infrastructure improvements that are going to make us more competitive, we can't

deliver on the kinds of health care reforms that Clinton and I are looking for." This expense in Iraq comes to \$144 billion a year. Shown below is a rough breakout of the federal budget from 2007. In total the federal government spent 2.73 trillion dollars, 5.2% in Iraq according to Obama's estimate of \$144 As seen in the graph, the federal government is currently spending 21% (\$561 billion dollars) on such health care plans as Medicare and Medicaid, which gives aid to 83 million Americans (about 27% of the total population). Thus it is seen that the cost of providing health care to roughly 1/4th of America is about 4 times greater than the cost of the Iraq war. Obama wants us to believe that the reason the other 73% of Americans don't have govern-


ment health care is because of the expense of the Iraq war? Something doesn't add up. In order to finance his reforms Obama purposes tax cuts for 95% of Americans, increased taxes for the other 5% and the elimination of tax loopholes for large corporations. 

The Lunchroom's New Look

This year, the cafeteria in CCNY's NAC has gained a completely new look. A short interview with CCNY's Food Service Director Joe Gallopini, confirmed that the renovations to the cafeteria occurred over the summer. In fact, the renovations are still in progress. Mr. Gallopini explained that the windows are currently being redone and that even the ceiling will eventually be renovated. He stated that the Facilities department headed the renovations while working under Vice President Santos. Santos hired consultants to design and arrange the new look for the cafeteria. While Mr. Gallopini, many students, and faculty members agree that the new design of the cafeteria is rather pleasing, there is another issue to be addressed.

The NAC houses a seemingly large cafeteria, when empty. However, there just does not seem to be enough tables during lunch. In the past there were a lot of people inhabiting this space at once, but there was always "room for one more," so to speak. The old cafeteria tables were long rectangular tables that seated thirty-six people maximum. There were fifteen of these long rectangular tables on one side of the cafeteria. The other side had slightly smaller ones that seated approximately six per table. However, there were twice as many small blue tables to compensate for the size difference. The cafeteria was able to seat a whopping 720 people with room, albeit only a little space to spare for people to circulate around the cafeteria. Due to the renovations, seating has been cut down severely.

HS MSE students have recognized this change in seating and have consequently altered their lunch habits. As soon as the bell rings for lunch, many of them burst out of the classrooms and rush down the hallways to get to the cafeteria early enough to find a seat or more importantly, a table. HS MSE students have now realized that seating in the cafeteria is very limited and that there is simply not enough space for them because CCNY college students are there as well. Friends in general, but students in particular tend to want to sit together. However, it is difficult to find a table that can seat them all and sharing a table with unknown strangers seems to just be out of the question. This leads to a lot of table hoarding which only furthers the spatial concerns. For an unknown reason, students believe that if one or two people are sitting at a large table, the entire table is "unavailable." Students will continue to circulate looking for an "available" table. Consequently, a "full" cafeteria will have many empty seats that no one is willing to take.

Lyndonna: CCNY


- K: Was this school your first choice?


year on the English Regents the class of 2009 had a 100% passing AND mastery rate and 100% passing and 96% mas-

Don't sleep in class and do pay attention, the day of the test it'll pay off.


Sleep at night, not in class.

I want to get in better shape and build more muscle. I really don't know where to start. What foods should I eat? What workout regiment should I follow to build more muscle?

Dear I want to look Better,

Alright, let's get big! It's going to be tuff answering this in one article.

Teen years are a great time to start thinking about putting on muscle - the trick is avoiding time wasting and injury producing mistakes. Building muscle optimally requires addressing the following areas:

- 1. Training
- 2. Diet
- 3. Rest
- Consistency
 - Cycling

Training

Training should take 40 minutes to 1 hour. Every body part should be trained 1 to 2 times per week and your workouts should stress different muscle groups. A sample breakdown might look like the table below. On the 4th day just start from 1 and follow through the list.

Training Day 1 Chest, Biceps, Triceps, Abs Training Day 2 Shoulders, Back, Abs, Cardio

Training Day 3 Legs (Quads, Hams, Calves)

The weights you should be using should restrict you to 8 - 12 repetitions per set. Legs should be worked for 16 to 20 reps per set. Rest for 60 to 90 seconds between sets.

Diet

Each meal should consist of sufficient quantities of proteins, carbs and fat. As far as protein is concerned your goal should be one gram of protein per pound of lean bodyweight per day. If you're thin use your actual weight, otherwise subtract anywhere from 15 to 25% to get your lean weight. Eat 4 to 6 times a day if possible spaced 3 to 4 hours apart. You may have to invest in a protein powder or meal replacement (from a muscle supplements company no slimfast stuff). Keep fat low. Meats should be lean, and all types can be. Carbs should come from beans, rice, sweet potatoes, yucca, and potatoes bread, pasta and sugars should be in small infrequent quantities.

Res

You must sleep well at night, at home. This means that those occasional naps in class gotta go. Sleep quantity doesn't matter as much as quality and depth so if you want to force yourself to stay awake often to hang out with friends, play games, etc.; you're wasting precious muscle building opportunities. Aim for the standard 6 to 8.

Consistency

Skipping workouts, taking layoffs and losing motivation will work against you.

Cycling

I'm not necessarily talking about bicycles here. After 3 months of consistent training take an active break for a week and just do cardio (bicycles are OK) and abdominals. After that, restart your workout with lower weight and double the repetitions for about 2 weeks, then go back to normal. You should be able to train with heavier weights at this point.

New York's Racetrack Riches


If you have ever watched Lifestyles of the Rich and Famous or the more recent MTV Cribs, you've seen the fabulous Ferraris and Lamborghinis. And if you are a car aficionado you never pass up the opportunity to get up close and personal with a classic car. A few weeks ago, I got just such an opportunity. At the time I was out on one of my frequent explorational spins in my own car when I came across a shack on the side of the road about two or three blocks away from the Kensico dam in Kensico, NY. The shack itself looked like it was on its last legs, but when I saw what was in the shack I did a double take: there was a Ferrari 250 GTO right in the window. I drove up onto the sidewalk in front of the place to do a little window shopping and I spied another 250 GTO, a pair of '56 Porsches, a Ferrari GT 250 Lusso (like in Ferris Bueller's Day Off), a 1984 Ferrari Testarossa, a Lamborghini Muira and most importantly, a 1966 Ford GT40.

The GT40 (nicknamed the Ferrari eater) was built for one reason and one reason alone: to beat Ferraris at extreme endurance races. The GT40 packed a 289cid V8 engine that produced just over 300 horsepower and is one of a hand full of 60's cars with a 5-speed transmission. Because of a feud raging between Henry Ford II and Enzo Ferrari, Ford attempted to beat Ferrari, who had won five consecutive years in a row (1960 to 1965), at the world's greatest endurance race: 24 hours of LeMans. Ford turned to his associates, Lotus, Cooper, and a company called Lola for help. Each of the companies came up with ideas but in the end Lola's was chosen. The prototype that was built was a mid-engine car with a ford V8, called the Lola MK VI. Even though on paper the car looked like an extreme race car, Enzo's Ferrari 250P crushed it and, sadly the MK VI didn't even finish.

Ford's staff then went back to the drawing board, but they didn't want to completely scrap the MK VI so they worked off 2 MK VIs. The next year the first Ford GT40 showed up at Nurburgring, Germany, one of the hardest endurance races in the world. Finally Ford thought they were ready for the LeMans race, so the GT40 was entered in the 1964 race. Unfortunately Ford was forced to forfeit due to mechanical problems and then lost again in 1965. In 1966 some subtle modifications were made and the GT40 became the GT40 MK II. The MK II won every 24 hour LeMans race from 1966 to 1969, some of these were 1-2-3 wins (meaning that all 3 of the MK IIs entered won, they took 1st, 2nd, and 3rd). 1-2-3 wins don't happen too often, so it would be a rare opportunity to see a car that is that high-quality.

I highly recommend taking a trip up to Kensico to soak up some race car history; it is an important part of American culture as well as Italian, British, and German. It could easily be considered as fascinating as any other art form because it reflects a quality of craftsmanship that is lost in many parts of the world. Today people just buy Japanese cars, which are built from the lowest of low end parts thrown together absentmindedly, only for fuel economy. I would sooner hang an etch-a-sketch on my wall and throw a Picasso in the trash. Soon cars like the one feature in Kensico will disappear. This might just be a once in a lifetime opportunity... why not

The Clutch Factor

On the first Sunday of October, when the dew settled and the air was crisp, many New York sports fans only had one game to look forward to the following week. For the past decade Yankees fans, old and new, have been spoiled by the outstanding success of the Yankees in October. This year, for the first time in 14 years October was Yankee-less. While Yankees fans complained about the playoffs, or lack thereof, Patriots fans booed the Patriots off the field when they lost their first regular-season game in 21 games. That brings to mind a question: who is more spoiled? Yankees or Patriots fans? But I digress. This October while the Red Sox were running their postsea-

son promoting "Soxtober" commercials and the Tampa Bay Rays were basking in their first post-season berth in the history of their franchise, the Yankees sat at home with their million dollar wives, without a golden ticket to the Fall-Classic. (I can't believe I am saying this, but I am rooting for the Tampa Bay Devil, er, "The Rays" to win the World Series. Anything to go against Boston, right?)

Fans are scrambling to find excuses for the Yankees 2008 season: some claim it's the insertion of the new manager, Joe Girardi, some look to the departure of Joe Torre (Does anyone else think it was stingy when the Yankees didn't celebrate Joe Torre in the closing ceremony of Yankee Stadium), and some even blame it on injuries. However, the real reason the Yankees missed the playoffs this season is because everything that could go wrong - did.

During spring training the expectations for the starting rotation were high. Phil Hughes had been regarded as the "Number One Pitching Prospect in Baseball" and scouts predicted that he would have a great year. Ian Kennedy was projected to have solid year, but there was no reason why. Near the end of 2007 Kennedy started four respectable, but not great games. But scouts know best right? Andy Pettitte was expected to have a solid year, and coming off of two straight 19-win seasons, Chien-Ming Wang was deemed the ace of the staff. The expectations for Mike Mussina were well below average. He was regarded as "the weak link" and many assumed that within two months he would be removed

from the rotation. What happened in reality was quite different: Mussina was the MVP of the staff, Phil Hughes and Ian Kennedy combined for zero, that's right, zero wins and Chien-Ming Wang struggled with injuries and finished with 9 wins. If you told Yankees fans that for a good portion of the summer three of the starters in the rotation would be Sidney Ponson, Dan Giese and Darrel Rasner, they would probably have said "who?"

Despite the pitching rotation imploding, the rotation had an average year and posted a middle-of-the pack ERA, 4.28 vs. 4.49 last year. Prior to the 2008 season many scouts projected that the Yankees offense would produce 950 runs. Instead, the Yankees lineup didn't even score 800 runs. Many made the excuse that the Yankees faced an unbearable amount of injuries.

Hank Steinbrenner claimed "it happens to everyone, this year we faced the injury bug." In fact, the Yankees did face an astonishing amount of injuries: A-Rod was out for a month, Matsui missed the majority of the year, Damon missed a month with a shoulder injury, Jeter was playing at 50% after a pitch hit his guiding (left) hand for about 5 weeks and Posada started behind the plate in only 21 games. The injuries aren't an excuse though, with a payroll over \$200 million the Yankees should have been equipped to overcome


There are a couple of reasons the Yankees failed to reach the post-

season for the first time since 1993. When fans look back at the 2008 season many will remember the clutch hitting of A-Rod. I apologize, that was not a typo it was a joke in poor taste that probably made Yankees fans cringe, A-Rod's inability to get a hit when it was needed most is one of the main causes of the failed season. A-Rod only hit homeruns when the Yankees were up by 4 runs or down by 6 runs, led the league in "addon runs" (runs that are scored, but have no effect on the games outcome, aka A-Rods specialty), and batted an astounding .246 with runners in scoring position, but he wasn't the only Yankee to bat poorly in clutch situations. The only Yankees that batted above .300 with runners in scoring position were Johnny Damon and Derek Jeter, consequently the Yankees 1 and 2 hitters. The Yankees ranked in the bottom third in getting the runner in from third with less than 2 outs.

Although the lack of clutch hitting may seem like the prime reason there are other factors to blame for the Yankees missing the playoffs, such as "The Stache" and "The Golden When it Giambi's good-luck charms, weren't. Thong.' became public knowledge that Derek Jeter, Jason Giambi and Johnny Damon strap up for games wearing a golden thong under the beloved pinstripes, a disturbing image was created in fan's minds. Has the Yankees organization really fallen that far that it hands out artificial mustaches to fans to promote all-star voting? El Museo Picasso de Barcelona es el centro de referencia para el conocimiento de los años de formación de Pablo Ruiz Picasso. Abierto al público en 1963, acoge un fondo de más de 3.800 obras, que componen la colección permanente, y ofrece una dilatada programación de exposiciones temporales.

Pero el Museo Picasso también es el testimonio de su vínculo con Barcelona. Un vínculo estrecho e inseparable, forjado en su adolescencia y su juventud, y que se prolongó hasta su muerte. La máxima expresión de su fuerte vinculación con la ciudad es el propio Museo Picasso de Barcelona, creado por voluntad personal del artista: gracias a la voluntad de Picasso y de su amigo Jaume Sabartés, Barcelona dispone hoy de la obra de juventud, así como de la serie completa de Las Meninas, de uno de los artistas más significativos de la escena artistica del siglo xx.

El museo, que ha pasado por sucesivas ampliaciones y remodelaciones, está iniciando una nueva etapa de despliegue, con la apertura de nuevos programas y líneas de acción, para convertirse en un espacio básico para el conocimiento y la educación en el sentido más amplio, que fomente el espiritu crítico y la participación del visitante. El museo quiere ser un espacio de diálogo, activando relecturas críticas y ofreciendo nuevas perspectivas en torno a Picasso y la colección en general. Ver presentación del director del museo.

El Museu Picasso en China, EE.UU. y Japón

El programa lo forman un ciclo de conferencias, proyecciones de cine, una exposición de cerámicas de Picasso y una muestra de trabajos escolares de alumnos de 9 a 12 años del distrito de Dongcheng sobre cómo ven la figura y la obra del artista.


El museo ha sido asímismo invitado a formar parte del Comité de Programa internacional para la próxima edición del Congreso Museums & the Web 2009. Forman parte del Comité representantes de los más prestigiosos museos, entre los cuales el Victoria & Albert de Londres, el museo Van Gogh de Amsterdam, el Smithsonian American Art Museum, el Getty Conservation Institute o el Exploratorium de San Francisco, así como representantes de universidades como la Panteion de Grecia, el departamento de Museum Studies de Leicester y la Universidad de Australia del Sur.

Rediscovering African-American Literature: A Teacher's Perspective

When I was a sophomore in college, I noticed a book entitled *Their Eyes Were Watching God* in a room at Jones Hall, one of Haverford College's grey-stoned dormitory buildings. I looked at the cover which showed an artistic rendering of a young black woman gazing up at the stars. I did not recognize the name of its author, a certain Zora Neale Hurston, and as I had many pages to read and term papers to write for my professors, my thoughts drifted away to more pressing concerns.

Still, that encounter with the book's cover became imprinted on my mind. In my senior year of college I registered for the course "African-American Literature I" with a visiting professor from the University of Nebraska. A brilliant, young African-American scholar, she attracted much student interest in her courses. We read slave narratives, including Olaudah Equiano's autobiographical account from the late eighteenth century and Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass. I remember studying the short stories of Charles Chesnutt collected in a large beige and brown hard-cover edition that I still have in my library today. We also read from an anthology entitled Black Voices, a collection of poetry and prose which included pieces by Claude McCay, Countee Cullen, and Langston Hughes that would grow to become among my favorite American poems.

The educational value of African-American poetry was evident to me from my earliest days as a teacher. Poems such as Hughes' "Ballad of the Landlord" and Brooks' "We Real Cool" have a crisp, incisive tone that teens can relate to. However, it has been primarily here at HS MSE that I have learned to incorporate African-American novels, short stories, essays, and biography in English class. Dr. Stern, our Departmental Chair in English, has played an important role in my learning and development in this area.

Last year, Dr. Stern completed extensive doctoral research on the use of Black English (i.e. the vernacular English spoken by African-Americans) by students in their discussion and writing about African-American literature. She has shared her research with her colleagues and during a summer course I recently took at Teachers College Columbia University which she taught. When Professor Stern taught her lessons on the Harlem Renaissance she arrived to class with a suitcase of books, pamphlets, and archival collections. We passed around the class special editions of Harlem Renaissance literature and photographs of 1920's Harlem and its star writers, poets, and scholars. I had not realized how vast and extensive this movement was until I leafed through this amazing collection. And it was in this course that I finally had the opportunity to study Hurston's acclaimed novel Their Eyes Were Watching God. My encounter with this novel had come full circle - and I could finally speak with understanding and compassion about the trials of its protagonist Janie Crawford.



In Their Eyes Were Watching God, Janie tells the story of her search for love and identity in conversation with her sisterly friend Pheoby. It is "Pheoby's hungry listening" that "helped Janie to tell her story." (10) Hurston's narrator alternates between Janie's voice in the black vernacular of West Florida, and an omniscient narrator that describes and explains in beautiful Standard English. Janie's tale is a love story, and this novel of a young black woman's gradual discovery of love through trial and error is very moving. I feel for Janie because she is so innately good and stoically persevering in a world cruel and indifferent to a woman of color. The granddaughter of slaves, Janie is born into a deeply patriarchal and racially segregated America. Yet, she creates for herself a remarkably free and independent life. Janie transcends the limits imposed on her (represented by her grandmother's post-civil war attitude) that restricts a black woman's place in marriage, ownership of property and social position.

Hurston captures the essence of romantic love with both philosophical observations by the omniscient narrator, and in dramatized scenes between Janie and her lover Tea Cake. The novel's chapters often begin with dream-like prose, filled with hope and possibility. In the beginning of chapter three, the narrator asks "Did marriage end the cosmic loneliness of the unmated? Did marriage compel love like the sun the day?" (21) How wonderfully the author uses the adjective "cosmic" before loneliness - it conjures a great dark existential void that, like for Hemingway, can be best fulfilled by love. By raising questions, the author invites speculation about the events in Janie's life. Hurston pays great attention to diction, as evidenced by her skillful use of simile, asking whether "marriage" brings "love" the way the rising "sun" brings "day." These are complicated and searching questions that Janie must ponder as she grows as a woman.

Their Eyes Were Watching God is ground-breaking because it portrays African-Americans as multi-faceted individuals, proud of their heritage and customs, and not the mere victims of white America. Hurston went on to write other novels including Moses, Man of the Mountain (1939) and Seraph on the Sewanee (1948). She was an established figure of the Harlem Renaissance when Ralph Ellison, who would become a great black novelist, arrived in New York City in 1936. Ellison had come to New York at age 22 to earn money after training as a musician in the south. He joined the left-wing New York City intellectual scene of the 1930's and 40's, eventually becoming a scholar, essayist and professor.

Ellison's fame rests primarily on his novel Invisible Man, a semiautobiographical work first published in 1947. My own engagement with this novel has reminded me of how essential rereading and reflection are in any serious study of literature. In my first reading of Invisible Man, I was as dizzied and bewildered as the protagonist himself, careening from the bizarre to nightmarish reality. From humiliation at high school graduation, to unjustifiable expulsion from college, to dangerous employment in a paint factory, and then onto the underground political scene in 1930's Harlem, the narrator tells what he did "to be so blue." (14) I was sure that this man is African-American, and that he bares some connection to Dostoyevsky's "Underground Man," but beyond that I wondered.

A month later I reread the novel. I detect pattern, notice symbol, and recognize allusion. The novel "opens" for me when I realize that the point factory is an intricate web of symbols. The narrator is hired by a paint company with the logo "Keep America Pure with Liberty Paints." (196) Another slogan reads "If It's Optic White, It's the Right White." (217) Liberty of mind and body is a central concern of Emerson; liberty also stands in contrast to slavery. White paint, no doubt, has something to do with "white" European Americans. This paint company specializes in making a white paint called "optic white." The use of the word "optic" catches my eye, because to be "invisible" is an "optic" illusion.

How ingeniously Ellison takes ordinary words and embodies them with deeper meaning. He uses symbols as codes, just as leading American writers had earlier. Although symbols in literature date back to ancient myth and poetry, such American authors as Melville, Hawthorne and Fitzgerald were obsessed with creating nuanced symbolic patterns. Ellison mastered this literary technique and re-employed it for his saga of the black man in America. I think, I sit with my books, and return once more to Dr. Stern's office. Once she completed her doctoral dissertation, Dr. Stern considered teaching the full African-American literature course that she has taught at Teachers College Columbia to her high school seniors. She describes her academic purposes in the course as "an explicit desire to prevent the stereotyping of African-American literary texts." Dr. Stern wishes her students to appreciate the "complex, debatable, and shifting ideas" among black writers and scholars. She emphasizes that there is no single line of thought in African-American discourse, but rather a complex web of ideas and texts which resist simplification.

As I think about ' is, I am humbled by how much there is to know. I recognize how fortunate I am to be a part of a small, specialized high school on the City College ' is. Here we are, by St. Nicholas Terrace, overlooking the "promised land" of the early twentieth century - the Harlem that was 'as the place where the greatest black writers once lived and wrote their stories and poems for generations to come. It seems fitting the' ty teach, study, and enjoy their work, and pass them on to the next generation.

Q: When does Harlem Is meet?

A: Harlem Is meets on either Monday, Tuesday, or Thursday from 4-6 after school. There are at least 15 sessions after the Christmas break and it ends with a presentation of the students' work.

Q: What is your favorite part of the club?

A: My favorite part of the club is the Hero Program because it allows so much interaction between the students and the hero. Artistically I enjoy the poetry and spoken word the most because it allows not very artistic people to express themselves.

O: How many students here at HS MSE attend Harlem Is?

A: We have between 30 and 40 students but because it is a city funded program we need to maintain a certain amount of people. Although we would like to have between 60 and 80 kids attending, we are successful enough in this school to maintain the funding. We especially need more kids to join the filmmaking branch.

Q: Why should students join Harlem Is?

A: People should join Harlem Is because it allows students in a very math and science based school to be a little more artistic. 
